# Differentiation and Tangent Lines 

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## Overview

This week's lab will provide practice finding locally linear approximations to functions. That is, we will be finding the equation of the tangent line to a curve.

## Maple Essentials

- The Tangents tutor is started from the Maple 12 user interface under the Tools menu:

$$
\text { Tools } \rightarrow \text { Tutors } \rightarrow \text { Calculus - Single Variable } \rightarrow \text { Tangents... }
$$

- The Maple commands involved with finding and plotting the tangent line to the graph of a (differentiable) function are:

| Command | Description |
| :--- | :--- |
| $:=$ | assignment |
| $x->$ | function definition |
| plot | plot one or more expressions |

## Preparation

Review $\S 3.1$ and $\S 3.2$ in Anton. Recall the point-slope form of the equation of the line:

$$
y-y_{1}=m\left(x-x_{1}\right)
$$

where $\left(x_{1}, y_{1}\right)$ is a point on the line and $m$ is the slope of the line. Next, solve the equation for $y$ and we get:

$$
y=m\left(x-x_{1}\right)+y_{1} .
$$

Now, we use the substitution $y_{1}=f\left(x_{1}\right)$ and this becomes:

$$
y=m\left(x-x_{1}\right)+f\left(x_{1}\right) .
$$

Finally, we know that the derivative evaluated at $x_{1}$ is the same as the slope of the tangent line at $x_{1}$. Thus we get the following formula for the equation of the tangent line at $x_{1}$ :

$$
y=f^{\prime}\left(x_{1}\right)\left(x-x_{1}\right)+f\left(x_{1}\right)
$$

## Activities

We will find the equation of the tangent line to the graph of $f(x)$ at the point $\left(x_{1}, f\left(x_{1}\right)\right)$ for several different functions. We will then graph the function and its tangent line on the same axes.

## Example Problem

We will solve the following problem together in two different ways:

- Find an equation for the line that is tangent to the graph of the differentiable function $f(x)=$ $x^{3}-2 x+1$ at $x_{1}=2$. Then graph the curve and this tangent line on the same axes.

The first way:

1. Launch the Tangents tutor.
2. Enter the function as $x^{\wedge} 3-2^{*} x+1$ and $x=2$, and change the number of iterations to 5 .
3. Click Display. The tutor will display the function and a series of secant lines, including the tangent line. The equation of the tangent line is displayed on the right.
4. Press the Animate button. The tutor will show the progression through the secant lines as $\Delta x$ gets smaller.
5. The tutor will return the last graph when you click Close.
6. If you want to graph the function and the tangent line, assign both in a Maple worksheet and write a plot command.

The second way:

1. Define and assign the function to $f$.
$>\mathrm{f}:=\mathrm{x}->\mathrm{x}^{\wedge} 3-2 * \mathrm{x}+1$;
2. Right-click and choose Differentiate. Then use a label (or right-click again) to assign this new function to $d f$.
$>\mathrm{df}:=$ label;
3. Find $f^{\prime}(2)$ and assign that value to $m$.
$>\mathrm{m}:=\mathrm{df}(2)$;
4. Find the tangent line $y=f^{\prime}(2)(x-2)+f(2)$ and assign it to $L$.
$>\mathrm{L}:=\mathrm{m} *(\mathrm{x}-2)+\mathrm{f}(2)$;
5. Plot the function and the tangent line using different linestyles.
$>\operatorname{plot}([f(x), L], x=-2.3$, linestyle=[solid, dash], title=''My Graph'');

## Functions

Find the equation of the tangent line to the graph of $f(x)$ at the point $\left(x_{1}, f\left(x_{1}\right)\right)$. Graph the function and its tangent line on the same axes. Choose a window that will give you a good view of both the function and the tangent line.
a. $f(x)=\sqrt{x}, x_{1}=\frac{1}{4}$
b. $f(x)=\frac{5}{x}+1, x_{1}=-2$
c. $f(x)=x^{2}, x_{1}=1$
d. $f(x)=2^{x}, x_{1}=3$
e. $f(x)=\cos (x), x_{1}=\frac{\pi}{6}$
f. $f(x)=\frac{1}{5 x-3}, x_{1}=1$

## Additional Practice

The TangentLine maplet gives a step by step method for finding the equation of the tangent line to $f(x)$ at the point $x=a$. Launch the maplet and click New Function. Follow the prompts to find $f(a), f^{\prime}(x)$, and $f^{\prime}(a)$. Then enter the equation of the tangent line as follows:

$$
y=f^{\prime}(a)(x-a)+f(a)
$$

The maplet will check each of your answers and let you know whether you are correct.
